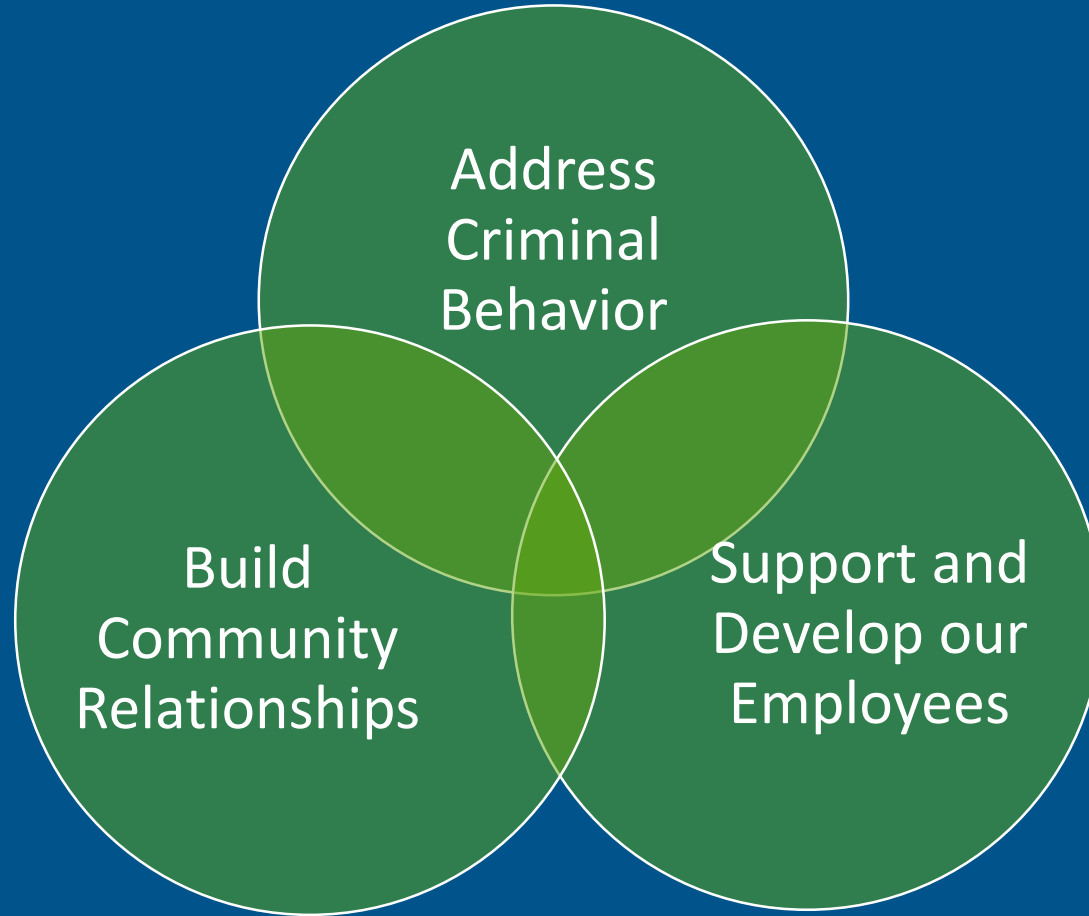

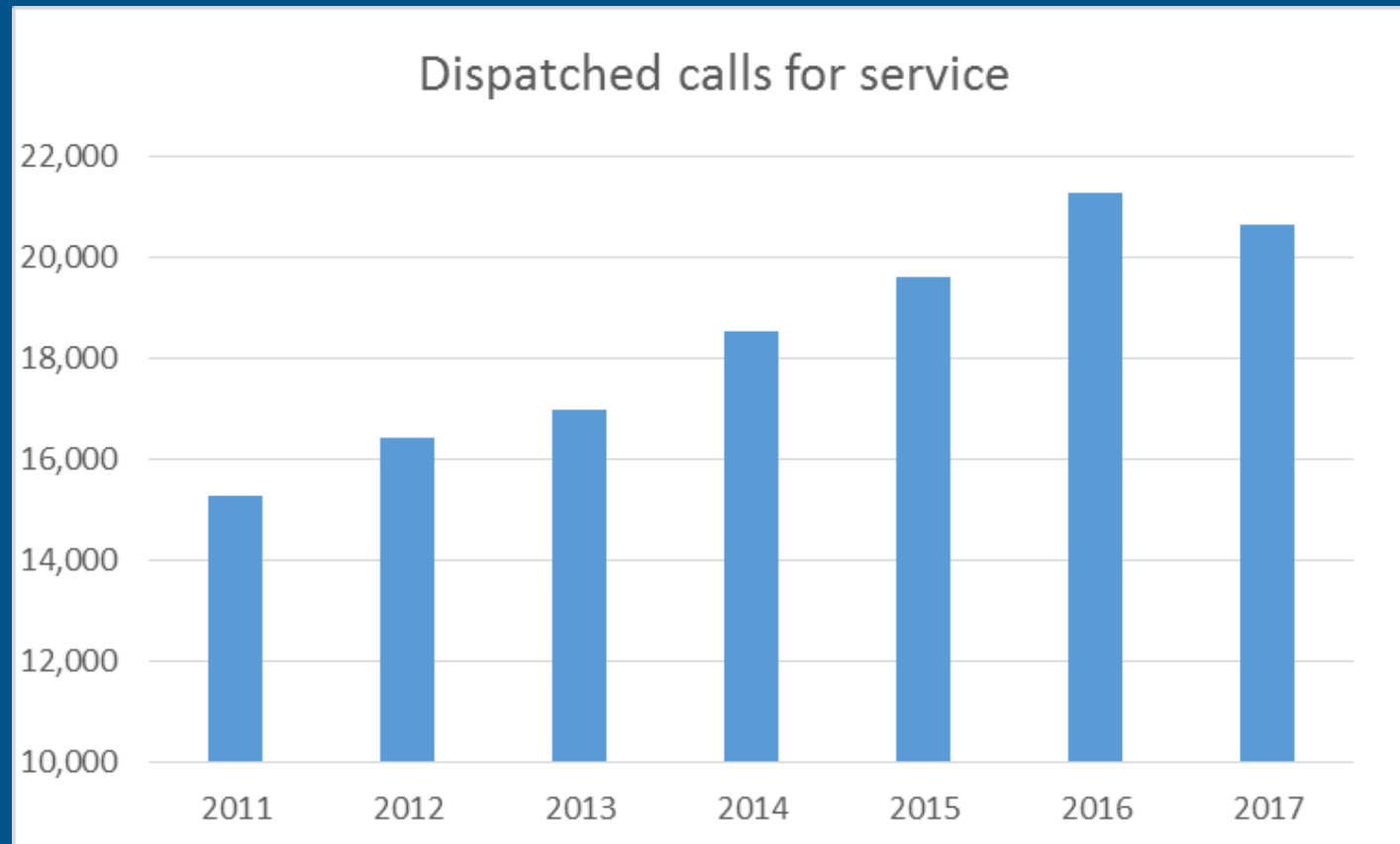

## Priority X – 3.87 minutes

- Critical Response- Obvious danger to life of citizen or officer

## Priority 1 – 7.73 minutes

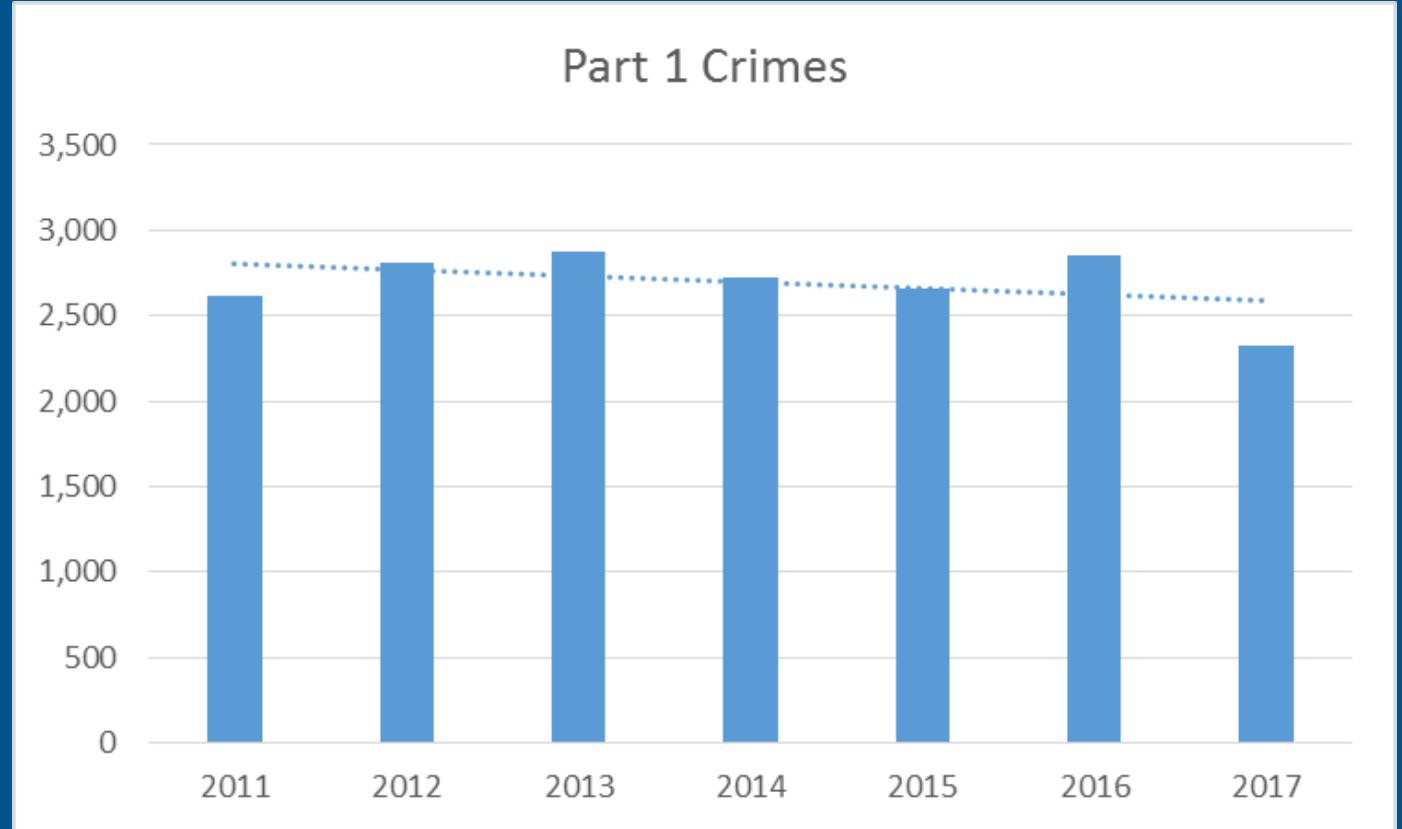
- Immediate Response- In progress crimes, injury collisions, silent/panic alarms

## Priority 2 – 12.28 minutes

- Prompt Response- Potential to escalate, verbal disturbances, blocking collisions

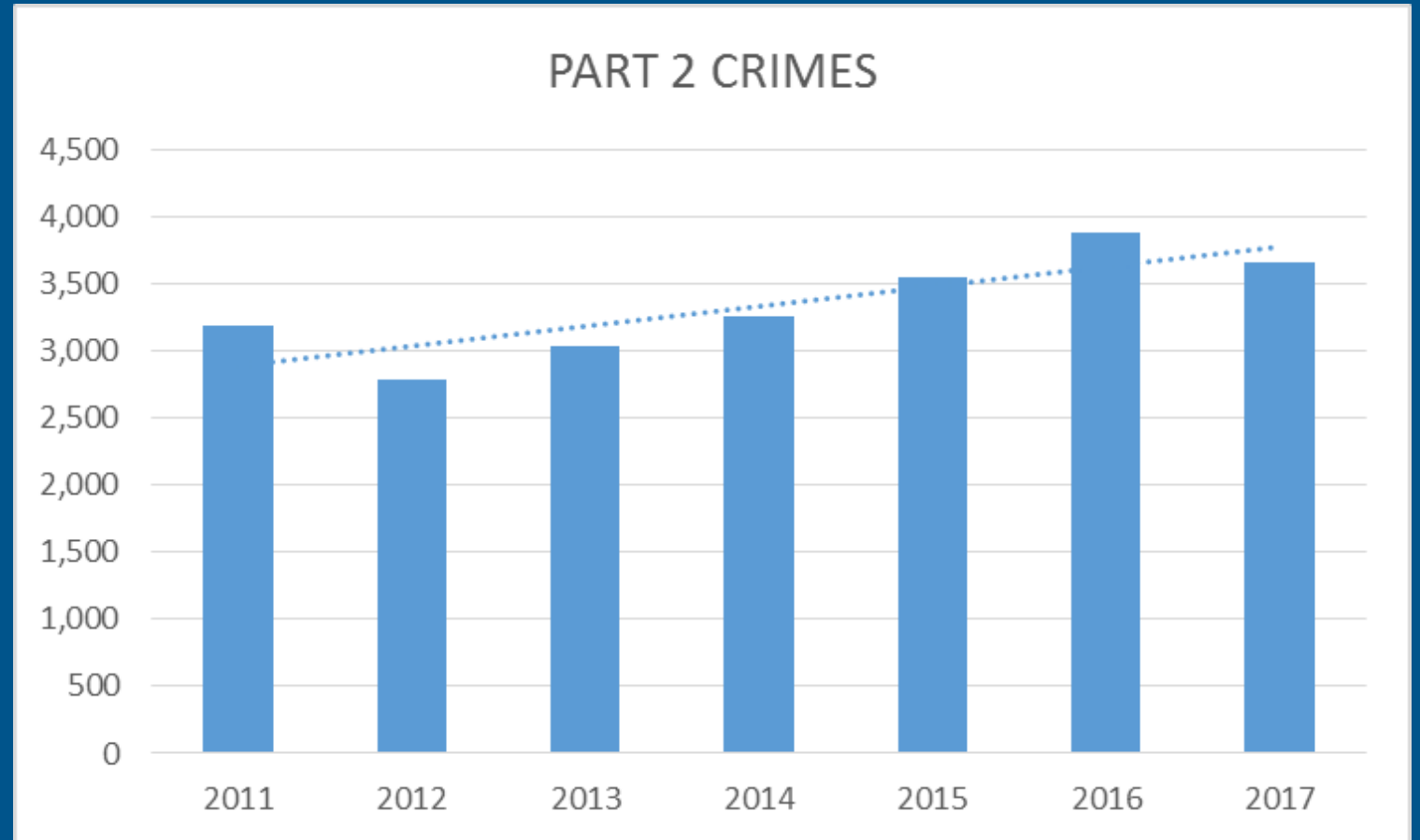

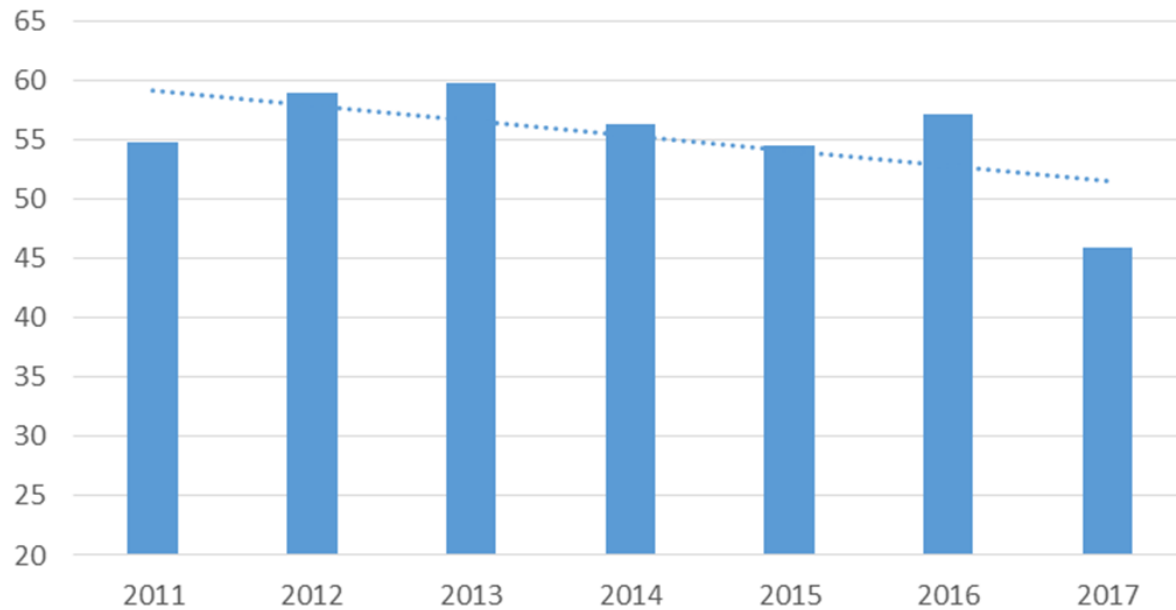

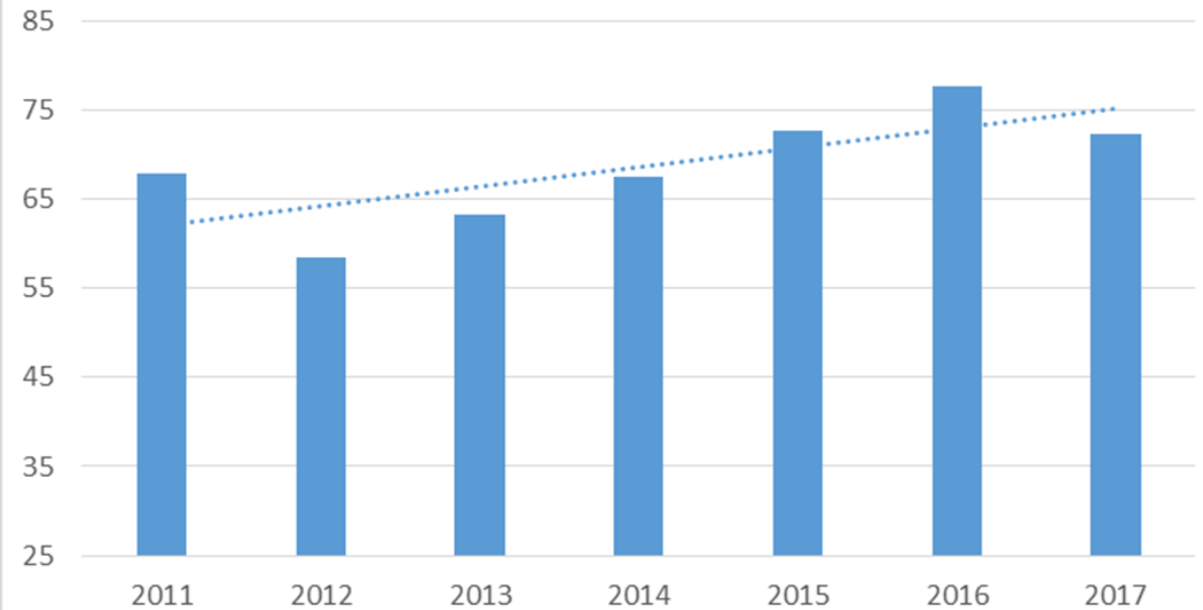


# TRENDS WITH POPULATION GROWTH REFLECTED

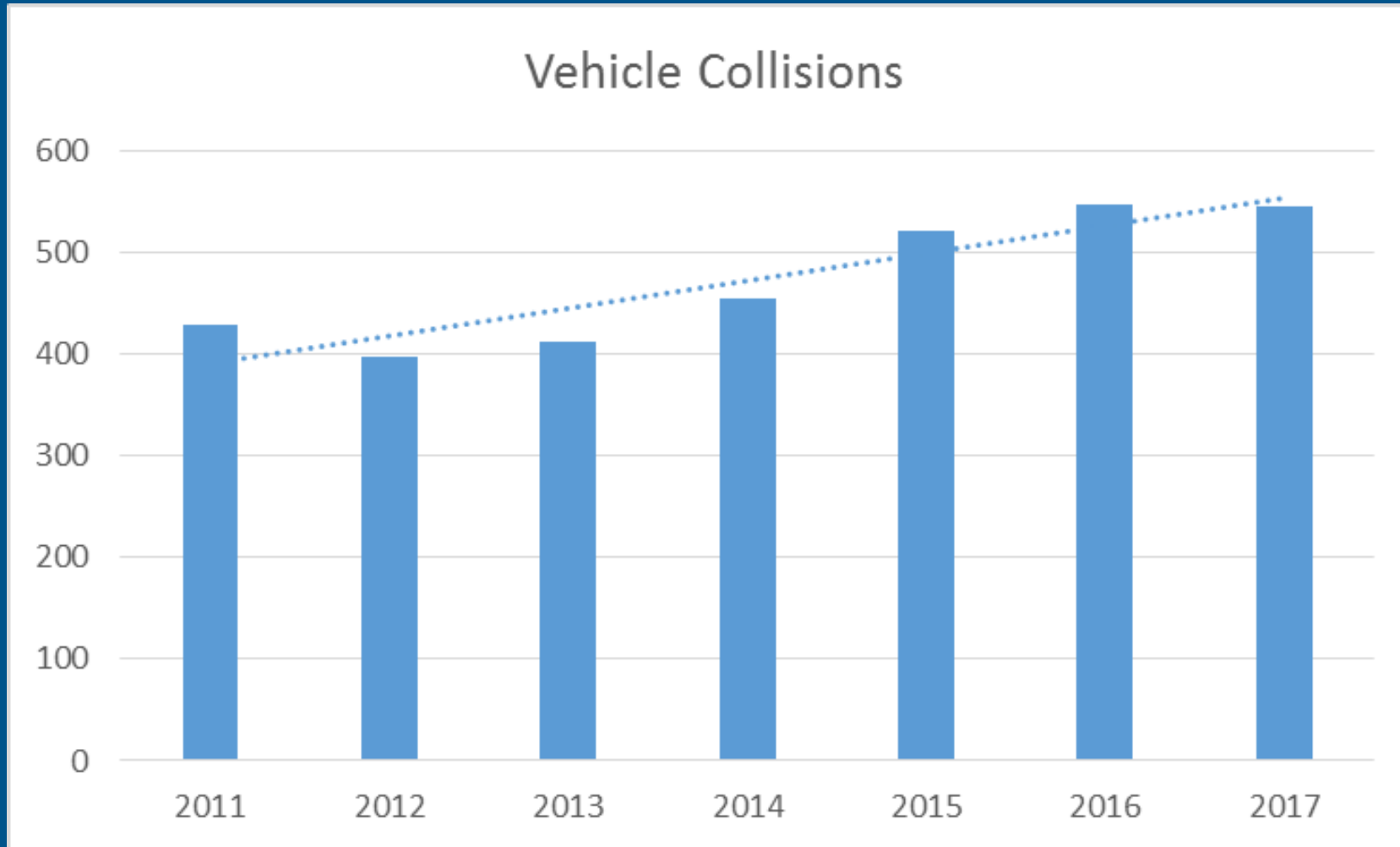
Part 1 per 1000



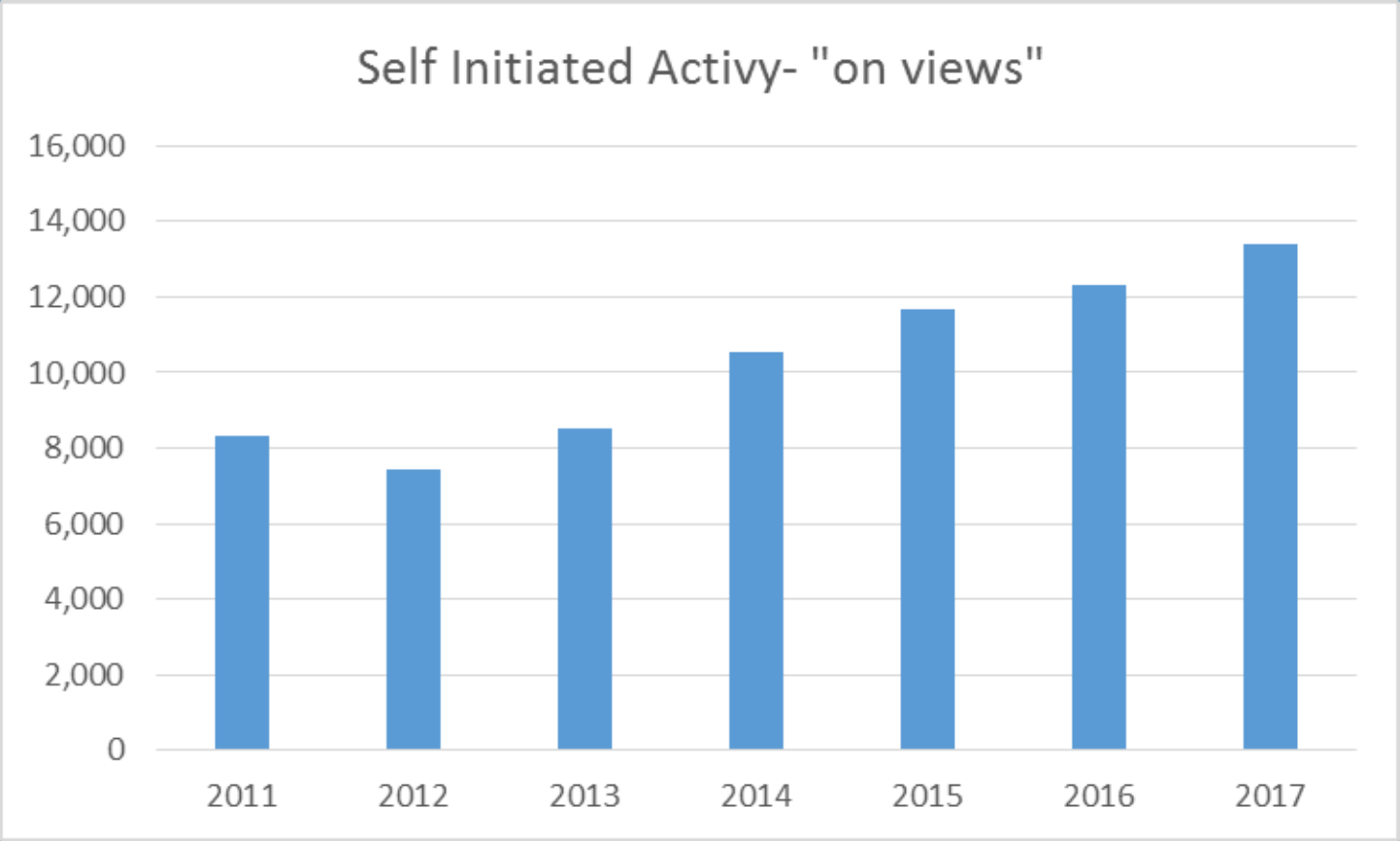
Part 2 per 1000



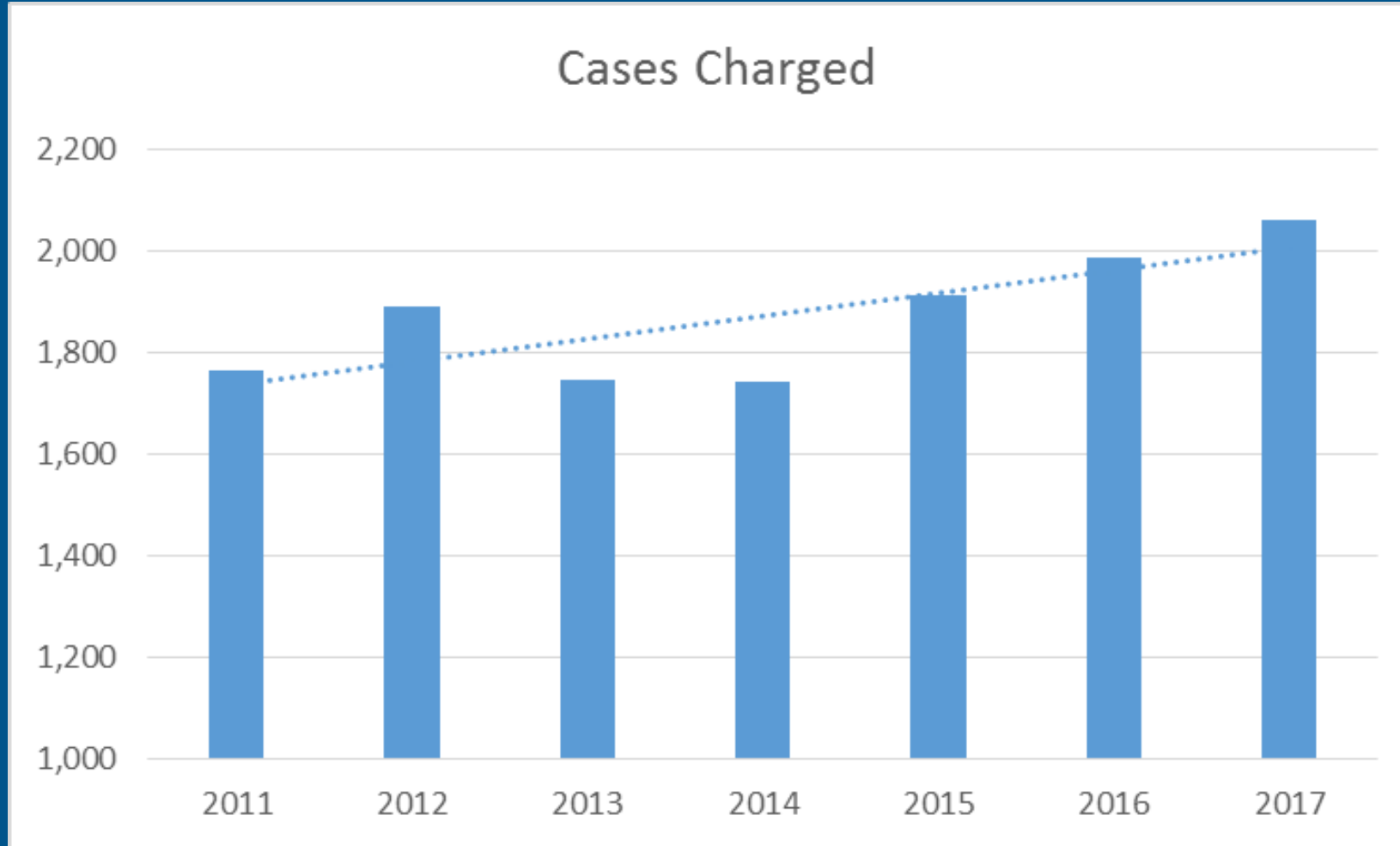
# VEHICLE COLLISIONS – INCREASING STEADILY
